A project on Energy Efficiency and Conservation in Building Sector in Botswana is launched with financial assistance from DANIDA. The project seeks to address fundamental problems such as the energy inefficient design and operation of buildings and the lack of energy efficiency awareness among users of buildings, resulting in higher energy consumption. The project has the following four main components: -

- A pre-project phase to obtain baseline data on existing energy use in the sector.
- Demonstration projects within building design and operation to encourage and promote the concept of energy efficient building design and operation.

2. INTRODUCTIONS AND BACKGROUND

2.1. Introductions.

All those present at the meeting were introduced.

2.2. Background to the project.

The background to the project was explained.

3. OUTLINE OF PROJECT.

3.1. Outline of project.

The objectives, outputs and activities of the project were explained.

3.2. BIDP participation.

BIDP were invited to join the proposed Task Forces which would provide guidance and input into the project activities. BIDP members are likely to have an interest in all three Task Force areas of interest.

The BIDP representatives indicated that they would be enthusiastic about the participation of BIDP in various aspects of the project, including the work of the Task Forces.

4. COMMENTS AND DISCUSSION.

4.1. Implementation.

How long is it expected to take to implement some of the project objectives, e.g. the amendments to the codes and regulations? There have been previous efforts to do this that have encountered a variety of obtacles.

It is recognised that it is not easy. Given the right structures and methodology, there is a possibility to achieve a lot. It is regarded as essential that the right stakeholders are given the opportunity to participate meaningfully in the project. It is for this reason that much time and effort is being devoted to meeting with as many stakeholders as possible during the inception phase of the project and inviting them to participate in the Task Forces.

If the support of the stakeholders is achieved, then the politicians are likely to support the project particularly when real financial advantages can be demonstrated.

4.2. BPC participation.

It was suggested that BPC be invited to participate in the Task Forces, since they are an important stakeholder in the project. The tariff structure for electricity has a major influence on behaviour, particularly in the private sector.

4.3. Liason with other governments.

Fourteen years ago efforts to amend the building regulations were frustrated because there was a problem getting permission to liase with other governments. Will the project get permission to do this if necessary?

This should not be a problem, as the project has high level support in Government.

4.4. Scope of the Project.

How broad is the scope of the project. Will it also consider the environmental implications of using different materials. E.g. insulation materials can be very environmentally damaging in their manufacture?

Priority will be given to the core scope which is energy efficiency. However the project is seen as working within the wider context of the enironmental impacts of buildings, and will remain sensitive to other environmental issues.

The Task Forces will have considerable influence on the details of the project activities and outputs.

4.5. Building Codes.

Performance based codes could be difficult to evaluate, since they will require modelling of the buildings.

Deemed to satisfy rules are easier to administer, but may result in less effective achievement of the desired energy efficiency levels, as they are not responsive to different ways of achieving the same or better results.

It may be considered to register consultants that can demonstrate the required skills to carry out energy evaluations, and then accept their reports, with proof of PI cover.

4.6. BOTEC staff houses.

A number of different designs of staff house were constructed at the BOTEC residential compound to test different approaches to energy effficiency. Are the results of these tests available?

4.7. BIDP participation.

BIDP would welcome the opportunity to participate in the project through the Task Forces and other activities. These are likely to begin in August / September this year.

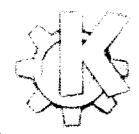

BOTSWANA - THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

"The built environment process is a hazardous mixture of power and weakness ostensibly involved in shaping the world. For their thoughts to be mobilized, clients depend on the provocation of others—developers, consultants, contractors, individuals or institutions. Therefore, incoherence is the underlying structure of the built environment. The industry is often confronted with a range and sequence of demands with parameters they did not establish, places they hardly know, issues they are dimly aware of, expected to deal with problems that have proved vastly superior to their own. The built environment is therefore by definition a chaotic adventure." (SA Homeowner 2002)

Botswana has seen substantial growth and development in the building industry in the last 10-years and this trend will continue with pressure in terms of business and commercial demands. It also appears that the stability and wealth of Botswana compared with its Southern African neighbours are leading the country to a greater role in the built environment.

However, no man is an island in the built environment and this is less so in a developing country with the many fold different projects and developments that are required to build a stable economy.

Teamwork is therefore the essence of all projects in the built environment, due to complexities and nature of each individual project, which precludes the general relationship of the transfer of skills and knowledge.

BIDP-THE FOUNDATION

Aver 25 years ago the government requested consultants in Botswana to form a local professional association for representative discussions between the government and professions, in connection with registrations of the professions to protect the general public and to provide professional standards and codes of professional practices.

At the time there were few consultants in the building industry and it was considered that a composite association representing all the individual professions where appropriate should be formed. This subsequently led to the birth of the Botswana Institute of Development Professions (BIDP).

The association started with chapters for architecture, engineering and surveying and subsequently expanded to cater for the other related professions, which did not have local professional representation.

The association established a formal secretariat with a registered office in Gaborone, which led to the expansion of the association and the establishment of a specialist technical library.

International recognition was subsequently achieved as BIDP received the sole representative of The Commonwealth Association of Architects, The Commonwealth Association of Surveyors and Land Economists etc.

The passage of time has allowed the development of many individual professional associations, which have taken over some of the roles of BIDP in particular the registration of some of the professions.

However, BIDP continues to prepare and update contracts for the building industry, which are widely used in the private sector and in government parastatals.

BIDP - THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Building projects are the most complex and expensive developments most people carry out in their lifetime. It has become increasingly apparent that there is a tendency to develop for clients to attempt to develop a building project without the right professional advice. However, it has been proven difficult for any one to get it right the first time without professional advice and guidance of the right quality.

Often the individual responsibilities of each building profession and the necessary plan of development are frequently not known or understood by clients from inception through construction to completion of a project, which can take a substantial number of years from start to finish.

The function of the BIDP to provide individual professional consultation, workshops and seminars continues. The association acts as one of the sole inter-professional associations where inter-professional contact between professions is maintained.

Continuity is maintained with the Association of Botswana Building Contractors (ABCON) and other building industry associations and participation with other government related workshops and seminars is always maintained and welcomed.

It is common ground for all members of the construction industry and all its stakeholders to meet regularly and develop the interactions to anticipate and respond to the changing requirements of the development of Botswana.

Interaction with The Commonwealth Association and other international bodies brings benefits to the nation, as contacts are frequently at hand and the latest international trends within the built environment benefits all members of the association and the general stakeholders in the industry.

BIDP - OTHER STAKEHOLDERS

"It is unwise to pay too much, but it is worse to pay too little. When you pay too much you lose a little money that's all. When you pay too little, you sometimes lose everything because the thing you bought was incapable of doing the thing it was bought for. The common law of business prohibits paying a little and getting a lot, it can't be done. If you deal with the lowest tenderer it is well to add something for the risk you run, and if you do that you will have enough pay for something better." (John Ruskin 1819-1900)

The interaction between BIDP and the whole spectrum of development clients is at the moment not in a progressive state due to lack of consistent involvement on a regular basis.

In a similar manner funding agencies can easily part with money to a client/developer without knowing if the expenditure is in fact being made and covered by real asset development.

The full benefits are not accruing from the interchange and cross relationships amongst financial institutions, pension funds, Insurers and BIDP. All financial transactions related to the built environment need to be understood to ensure that prudent risk management is addressed with the benefit of sound research and appropriate knowledge bases.

The interaction of BIDP can give significant benefits and risk management returns from early feasibility studies, through construction to the completion of the developments. The results are quite disproportionate from the time input required with the passing of knowledge and benefits being passed to stakeholders.

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The association provides unique opportunities for significant developments in Botswana for the benefit of all stakeholders, which are not generally matched by the individual professional bodies. These provide ideal opportunities for questions and answers in the field of continuing professional development (CPD) and provide real time benefit for the inquiring professional mind.

BIDP eliminates the necessity to contact many individual professional associations to establish development parameters and codes of ethics, without which any development is fraught with difficulties that can descend as money, as such haste can frequently engender unforeseen difficulties.

The representation of individuals from independent professional bodies and institutions etc. facilitates the sourcing of information and advice that undoubtedly benefits the stakeholders in understanding the complexities and pitfalls of the industry therefore, allowing its development growth with the long term objectives.

In essence, BIDP provides a **one-stop shop** to assist the stakeholders understand and protect clients, developers, consultants and the industry at large.

BIDP- MEMBERSHIP EXPANSION

The membership has continued to expand and is becoming more widely focused as requirements of individual professions have changed with the diversification of local, regional and international trends in the Built Environment.

More and more growth is seen within the field of Developers, Facilities Management, Property Management etc., which has shown little, or non-representation within the association. BIDP is encouraging professionals who are not specialist in the building industry but are related to the built environment to assist with the broader dissemination of knowledge outside the immediate building professions.

Around the **silver anniversary** of BIDP in February 2004, we feel it opportune to draw attention of a wider sphere of professionals to achieve the progressive development goals within the built environment.

This invitation is extended to professionals in all sections of the private sector, Central Government, Local Government, and Parastatal bodies.

SUGGESTIONS FOR CHANGES TO BIDP CONTRACTS WITH QUANTITIES

Clause 2 (2)

This clause is to be omitted.

Wehance

I do not think it ever happened that a contractor asked an architect whether he was entitled to issue an instruction. The Contractor normally carries out the architect's instructions and claims the cost thereof thereafter.

LNK: Disagree, think it should be left in. There are many instances when the architect may issue an instruction that is in fact questionable under the Contract terms, and to disallow the contractor right to question or not comply would not be fair for example: condemned work, opening up of works, removal of materials, contractor's personnel, etc.?

Clause 12

Omit the words in the fourth line "Fifth edition 1977 (amended 1970, 1981 and 1984)" and replace them by the words "latest edition as"

YES 1

The reason is that the fifth edition is not being used any longer. Shortly the seventh edition may be published.

Clause 16

LNK: OH

The number in front of the clause is now "6", which should be "16"

ENK: OH

Clause 23

at the end change "then the Architect as soon as he is able to estimate the length of the delay....." to "then the Architect shall within 28 days after having received the full information from the Contractor make in writing a fair....."

NO . Change

The reason for this change is that the longer the architect waits to make an award for extension of time the more he takes away the right of election from the contractor, i.e. to decide whether he must work 24 hours per day at his own cost or to pay liquidated damages. The Contractor shall forthwith give notice of the delay to the Architect and it would therefore be logical when the architect would forthwith decide whether extension of time should be granted or not.

LNK: The problem here is that contractors usually do not provide full information required for the architect to make an assessment. Claims submitted by contractors are general, sketchy, improperly substantiated if at all. Architects then usually repeatedly as for this information; which is not expeditiously provided.

Clause 23(j)

Omit the footnote.

Any clause can be omitted by agreement by both parties. The clause is very logical and is in terms of common law. When any circumstance arises that suddenly the contractor cannot get (e.g.) Robertson's roof sheets because the factory burnt down it should not be the contractor who is at fault and should suffer because there is no reason for getting extension of time.

Clause 24

LNRSOK

Add sub-clause 24(f) "Any late payment by the Employer made in excess of the period stipulated in clause 30 and the Appendix."

In the event that the Employer pays late the only remedy by the Contractor is cancellation of the contract in terms of clause 26(1). This is a very serious step which does not always want to be taken by contractors. It is normal that the Contractor bases payments to his suppliers and subcontractors on the money which he receives from the Employer. When the Employer pays late the contractor normally gets into trouble.

LNK OK

Add sub-clause 24(g) "any extra work in connection with the removal and safeguarding of fossils, antiquities and other objects of interest and value as described under clause 34(1) hereof)

Clause 34(2) is a duplication of clause 24 and should be omitted.

LNK: OK but only if the proposed sub-clause 24(g) is added

No hank

Clause 25(1) (d) This is strange that this clause (no. 17) is mentioned here specifically as if the matter of subletting would be a major sin!) There may be many other important clauses which could be breached by the Contractor. I suggest that clause 25(d) is changed to "If he is in major breach of any other clause in this contract"

This would cover other items as well.

LNK: OK

Omit the last two lines of the first paragraph. Clause 30 (1)

> The words are irrelevant. The certificate is the Architect's responsibility and he cannot make it without having carried out a proper valuation either by himself or by the quantity surveyor.

LNK: Disagree. There are instances where a certificate needs to be issued closer or even further apart, depending on progress, materials procurement, costly local authority quotations (BPC, BTC etc) and other special circumstances

Clause 30 (2) Dt: need to indude somewhere in Connat mention of Conduct laws of Boxwon

In the fifth line after the word "...... condition)" replace the word "and" by a comma and at the end of the sentence add "and less any tax deductions which the Employer is compelled to deduct in terms of any law in Botswana"

The reason is that otherwise the Employer is not entitled to deduct withholding tax.

LNK: OK, but I suggest for clarity and correct grammar if the word "and" is used as above, the brackets be omitted:

this should in fact be clause 30 (3) whereas the following clauses should be Clause 30 (2A) I Chelle organido renymbered. In Lames about

LNK: OK

Clause 30 (2A) (e) In the third line remove the number "2" and bring the next line back.

LNK: OK but this clause will now be 30(3)#

Omit sub-clauses (1) and (2) altogether.

It is not logical to inform the Architect every time a price is going up. To comply with this clause hundreds of letters should be written by the contractor to the architect or quantity surveyor. In the absence of a Haylett or similar formula proven cost should be sufficient.

LNK: OK

Page 26

Omit the foot note.

The parties have always the right to negotiate further. This foot note is a bit too much.

ENK: OK &

Clause 34(1) Change to clause 34 and omit clause 34(2)

See clause 24 above.

ENK: OK

Clause 35 (1)

Omit all the words in the last line after the words "...Arbitration Act" and replace them by "(CAP 06:01) as amended". At the same time insert the word "Botswana" before the words "Arbitration Act".

The reference to the arbitration act was not done correctly.

LNK: OK 4

Further add "The arbitrator shall be the person named in the appendix, or when no name has been inserted a person appointed by the President of the Botswana Institute of Development Professions at the request of either party."

Dispute resolution should be a fast procedure. Normally one finds that a long period is required for the agreement between the parties who the arbitrator will be. By inserting a name at the signing of the contract that period can be shortened.

Clause 35 (2) Omit this clause altogether.

It is not correct that a dispute cannot be resolved until practical completion has been attained. I have come across a situation where the subcontract agreement was coupled to the main agreement and where the subcontractor declared a dispute because of non-payment by the main contractor. The main contractor used this clause as a reason to postpone the arbitration until practical completion of the building was attained, one and a half year later!

LNK: Im not sure about this. A good number of disputes particularly on EOTs and costs arising in connection may only arise and/or be resolved around the time or even only after practical completion/final account stages. Perhaps the clause should be left in but re-worded

Clause 37

Add this new clause: "Notwithstanding any other remedies set down in this agreement, should the Contractor require a payment guarantee from the Employer, then the Employer shall be obliged to provide such a guarantee prior to the commencement of the contract works. The extent of such guarantee shall be ten percent of the contract sum, payable on first demand by the Contractor but not due for payment until after 28 days after any payment is due from the Employer to the Contractor."

It is not correct to make a contract one-sided. In terms of clause 36 when the Contractor must provide a surety, the contractor also has the right to claim a payment guarantee. I have copied the clause from our Nominated Subcontractor's document changing the words of the parties. In the Nominated Subcontract Agreement the party asking for the payment guarantee will pay for the cost thereof. I do not know why this is as both parties in any contract should have equal rights.

LNK: OH

Back page .

Change the BIDP logo and two times the words "Institution" to "Institute"

General note

Amazingly the function of the quantity surveyor has been described on page 2 at the bottom. The words "quantity surveyor" are mentioned a number of times in the contract but not in the section where they should have been mentioned (clause 30 -certificates and payments - page 21). The function appears in clauses 3(1), 3(7), 11(4), 11(6), 24, 31(c), 34(2).

ENK: Yes perhaps where Clause 30 (and the above mentioned/others clauses specific to the quantity surveyor's functions) should be worded as "... Architect or the Quantity Surveyor ... " Except the opening sections of Clause 11(4) "__required by the Architect or subsequently sanctioned..." Clause 11(6) "...by the Contractor, the Architect is of the opinion ...".

complete at the day mentioned in the certificate and the subcontractor will enjoy the same rights as the contractor in regard to reduction in retention and return of performance guarantee.

There is no mentioning in the subcontract about issue of a certificate of Practical Completion and of Final completion, although in Government contracts these certificates are issued by DEMS. Contractually this is correct as both certificates should be issued to the main contractor and not to the subcontractor. The main contractor has an obligation to inform all his subcontractors about this matter. The same applied to the clause below.

Clause 10.7

(This is a new clause) Immediately when the Certificate of Final Completion is issued to the Contractor he will send a copy thereof to the subcontractor, who will be relieved of all further duties in terms of the contract.

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these accounts are set out below:

a) Basis of Preparation

The accounts are prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standards. The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain property, plant and equipment, marketable securities and investment properties.

b) <u>Turnover</u>

Turnover represents subscriptions and other sources of income which are recognised on receipt of payment net of value added taxes and discounts. The organisation operates purely on a cash basis and does not grant credit for any aspect of its operations.

c) Foreign Currencies

Foreign currency transactions are accounted for at the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions. Gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies, are recognised in the profit and loss account.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is charged over the estimated useful lives of the assets in equal annual installments to write off each asset over the following peiods.

Stock and work in progress are valued by members of the Council at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

f) Stock Revaluation Reserve

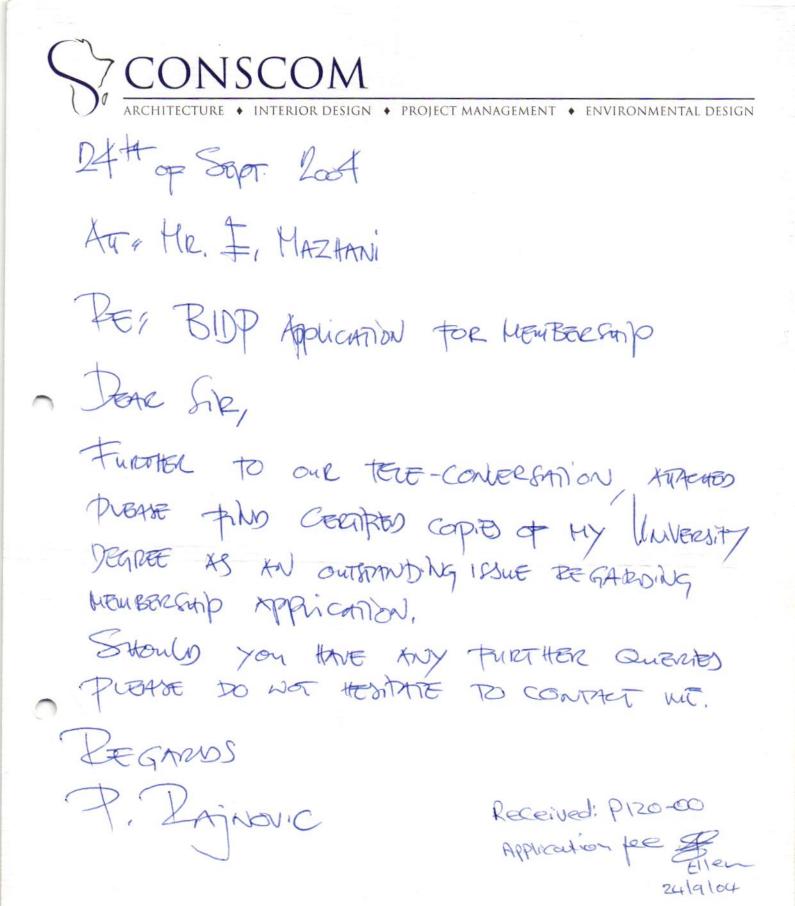

Foreword

Even though leaders of different associations still represent their respective members, the leaders agreed that all correspondence be handled to and from BOCCIM to facilitate single point administration.

Background

The meeting was called by the Tender Committee chairperson after members of the development professions in Botswana complained to the Tender committee about the UB CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS TENDER. BOCCIM Construction Sector facilitated as it is its mandate to take up issues that its members bring to their attention.

Proceedings

The Chairperson of the UB tender committee opened the meeting by welcoming every body and invited the professional association representatives to present their case.

Professional Association members presented what the professional fratemity sees as fundamental flaws in the recent tender to the UB Tender committee on behalf of their members. The issues were as follows; assess ment

- 1. The tender specifications as issued do not amount to "tenders" as major ingredients of a tender are missing e.g. marking criteria. The criteria could have given prospective bidders a guideline as to the extent of information required, enhanced consistency in the format of submissions and therefore provided a level playing field.
- Lack of clarity on project details This information as advertised made it difficult for companies to make an informed decision on which project to participate, some unnecessarily bought either all, one or a few out of guesswork even though they feel that they may qualify for either all, one or none. Upon clarification, bidders would want to be given an opportunity to rectify this.

- Selection criteria
 If the criterion is based on the "Slightly Modified" FIDIC version as the postponement letter
 implies, bidders were entitled to the information during tendering.
- 4. The postponement letter says the VAT issue has been noted, what is meant by noted?
- It is procedural that any queries and answers pertaining to a tender be communicated to all prospective bidders, particularly if they are of a general nature. This was not the case and this is likely to lead to inconsistent submissions, with some bidders having an unfair advantage.
- Bidders had difficulty in identifying the right person to address queries to; UB should include particulars of a contact person, who is also technically conversant.
- 7. A request was made for the UB to justify charging P220.00 per submission when companies are currently struggling to make ends meet? The UB was requested to re-visit the charge particularly where the services of civil structural engineering were being split up, meaning they have to spend even double what other disciplines are spending.
- A request was made for a feedback mechanism to inform unsuccessful bidders on who has been selected for the job.
- 9. Whether the UB allows Joint Ventures.

Resolutions made on the day;

- UB promised to furnish bidders with the "Slightly Modified FIDIC Version" to address the selection criteria query by Wednesday 28th September to give bidders sufficient time to re-visit their submissions ready for the extended October 06th submission date.
- UB promised that the VAT issue is being addressed.
- 3. Joint Ventures between local practices are allowed.
- Bidders are at liberty to go and establish the scope of work for themselves even before they
 pay so that they may purchase the right documents.

The Tender committee chairperson assured the Private Sector delegates that they will be responding to all other issues raised without stopping the tender because of "urgency" constraints. He further said if they find that the submissions made do not meet their expectation, that's when they will go back to the drawing board.

The BOCCIM Construction sector chairperson expressed disappointment that it does no seem to matter to the UB, that issues raised are fundamental and do go to the root of the matter.

BOCCIM thanked the Tender Committee for giving them an audience and offered the services of professional associations, when ever the UB requires professional advice.

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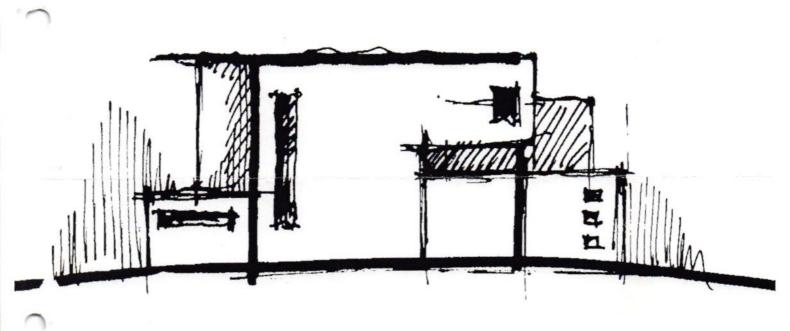

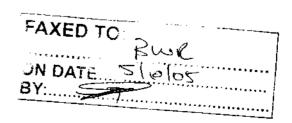

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE <u>BOTSWANA INSTITUTE OF DEVELOPMENT PROFESSIONS</u> HELD ON 6 OCTOBER 2005.

It is a pleasure to give my report at this meeting, a report, which just like other years shows that the BIDP is growing continuously by accumulating funds. We do not have much expenditure as is shown on page 5 of the report. Administrative costs mainly consist - a breakdown is shown on page 8 - of secretarial fees, the costs of the directory distribution and legal fees. The latter is a new item in our operating expenses. It is brought about by a company which contravened the industrial Property Act by photocopying our BIDP agreements, rather than buying them. The BIDP Council has taken the company to Court as a possible deterrent for others which might do the same thing.

As shown on page 5 the income from publications is a major factor in our total income and if such income would fall away simply because companies were to make copies of our agreements the BIDP should find alternate ways of making money just to stay in existence.

For years we have been talking about a Professional Centre and it is envisaged that with the continuous increase in income that centre might be a possibility shortly.

This year we have written off all the assets of the BIDP, a computer, and some furniture. As the secretarial duties are carried out by the office of BWR Quantity Surveyors there is no need to purchase further equipment and/or furniture. I must thank Marina Bathuleng Mookodi for the work that her office is doing by selling publications and collecting membership fees.

Because of the very sound financial position the BIDP has not increased the membership fees for the last five years and we believe that it will not be necessary this year either as income covers expenditure by far.

Last but not least I want to thank my fellow Council members for the support that they have given me to carry out my duties and I hope that together we will be able to ensure the future of the BIDP.

(d) Instead of the valuation referred to in subclauses (b) and (c) hereof, an inclusive price may be agreed between the Architect/ Supervising Officer and the Contractor prior to the contractor carrying out any instructions such as referred to in those sub-clauses.

The Contractor shall comply with all notices 3 required by any statute, any statutory instrument, rule or order or any regulation or byelaw applicable to the Works and shall pay all fees and charges in respect of the Work legally recoverable from him.
