CONSTITUTION

1. NAME

The name of the Society shall be the Botswana Institute of Development Professions (BIDP) and hereinafter is referred to as the Institute.

2. OBJECTS

The Institute is established in Botswana:

- a) To promote the advancement of and to facilitate the acquisition of that knowledge which constitutes the professions related to development in Botswana.
- b) To promote the general interests of the professions and to maintain and to regulate them in the public interest.
- c) To promote the participation of central and local authority into providing educational institutions in Botswana at Professional and Technical level and to stimulate and encourage the interest and participation of the Batswana people into entering the professions.
- d) To promote the establishment of a professional centre in Gaborone to facilitate the use of common resources in conjunction with the provision of common support services for the professions.
- e) To establish and maintain good relations with other professional bodies in Botswana, to establish links with similar Societies in other countries and to join and support any international bodies concerned with the work of the professions.

3. MEMBERSHIP

- a) The membership of the Institute shall consist of the following:
 - (i) Honorary Members
 - (ii) Ordinary Members

- (iii) Associate Members
- (iv) Student Members
- (v) Retired Members
- (vi) Corporate Members
- (vii) Reciprocal Members
- b) Honorary Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall be invited by the Council after obtaining prior approval by ballot of the Members of the Institute eligible to vote;
- (ii) the member shall not be in practice in Botswana and by reason of his experience, knowledge or position may be able to render assistance in promoting the objects of the Institute;

Entitlements:

- (i) the member may take part in all activities and General Meetings and make use of all facilities provided by the Institute (except those which the Council considers are privy to Ordinary Members of the Institute;)
- (ii) the member shall possess no right of voting or intervening in the affairs of the Institute except when specifically provided for by the Council on any special occasion after obtaining prior approval by ballot of the Members of the Institute eligible to vote;
- (iii) the member shall not be asked or called upon to contribute to the funds of the Institute which provision would not preclude any gift he/she may wish to make to the Institute.

c) Ordinary Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall be elected by the Council of the Institute upon being proposed and seconded by two Members eligible to vote and shall possess at least one of the following:
- a. have passed such examination as may from time to time be prescribed or approved by the Council, and have at least two years approved practical experience in the relevant part of the professions;
- b. hold the professional qualification of such professional Institution or body as may be approved by the Council from time to time;
- c. have such experience as considered appropriate by the Council.

Entitlements:

- (i) the member shall have full voting rights;
- (ii) the member shall be eligible to use the initials MBIDP after his/her name;
- (iii) the member shall be eligible for election as office bearer on the Council.

d) Associate Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall be elected by the Council upon being proposed and seconded by two Members eligible to vote;
- (ii) the member shall have passed an examination referred to in (c) (i) above, and who is in the process of acquiring the approved practical experience therein referred to, in a related field accepted by Council.

Entitlements:

- (i) the member shall have full voting rights;
- (ii) the member shall be eligible for election as office bearer on the Council.

e) Student Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall be elected by the Council upon application to the Secretary;
- (ii) the member shall be a person bona fide following approved training.

Entitlements:

- (i) the member shall be entitled to attend General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute but shall have no right to vote at any such meeting;
- (ii) the member may elect a representative entitled to vote at General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute.

g) Retired Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall have formally retired from practice but who wishes to continue his/her connection with the Institute;
- (ii) the member must provide to the Council of satisfactory proof that he/she has retired from practice;
- (iii) the member shall pay one-half of the current annual subscription for the class of membership he held before retirement or such lesser amount as the Council may deem fit in the circumstances of each specific case.

Entitlements:

- (i) the member shall be entitled to attend General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute but shall have no right to vote at any such meeting;
- (ii) the member may elect a representative entitled to vote at General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute.

h) Corporate Member

Membership Requirements:

- (i) the member shall be a Corporate Body as approved by Council from time to time;
- (ii) the member shall be elected by the Council of the Institute upon being proposed and

seconded by two members eligible to vote.

Entitlements:

(i) the member shall have one representative eligible to vote at General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute.

i) Reciprocal Member

Membership Requirements:

 (i) the member shall be an organisation with similar aims and objectives prepared to enter a reciprocal agreement to take part in all activities and general meetings and make use of all facilities provided by the Institute;

Entitlements:

- (i) the member shall have one representative eligible to vote at General Meetings and Ordinary Meetings of the Institute;
- (ii) the member shall not be asked or called upon to contribute to the funds of the Institute.

i) Resignation from Membership

Any Member wishing to resign from the Institute shall submit his/her reSecretary. The resignation shall take effect from the date of receipt by the Secretary of such notice.

Any person who resigns or is removed from membership shall not be entitled to a refund of his/her subscription, or any part thereof, or any monies contributed by them at any time.

All members must continue to be eligible for membership. If a member does not meet the requirements for membership then he/she must resign or apply for the appropriate category of membership, failing which they may be removed from membership by the Council.

4. DESIGNATIONS

An Ordinary Member shall be entitled to use after his name the initials MBIDP.

5. MANAGEMENT

a) The affairs of the Institute shall be managed by a governing body to be known as the Council. The council shall comprise of the following officers:

The President of the Institute

Vice President

Secretary

Treasurer

and minimum of two Members

The Council shall all be Ordinary and/or Associate Members of the Institute.

b) (i) The President shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting for a period of one year and shall be eligible for re-election to that office for a period of up to three (3) years. After 3 years the President shall not be eligible for re-election to that office for a period of one year after his retirement from office. The President shall assume office at the end of the Annual General Meeting at which he is he or she is elected and shall retire at the end of the Annual

General Meeting at which a successor is elected.

When present the President shall take the chair at all Meetings of the Institute and the Council.

- (ii) The Vice President shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting for a period of one year and shall be eligible for re-election to that office for a period of up to three (3) years. After 3 years the Vice President shall not be eligible for re-election to that office for a period of one year after his retirement from office. The Vice President shall assume office at the end of the Annual General Meeting at which he or she is elected and shall retire at the end of the Annual General Meeting at which he or she is successor is elected. In the absence of the President he shall take the chair of all meetings of the Institute and the Council.
- (iii) The Secretary shall be elected for a period of one year at the Annual General Meeting and shall be eligible for re-election.
- (iv) The Treasurer shall be elected for a period of one year at the Annual General Meeting and shall be eligible for re-election.
- (v) One Council Member shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting for two years. He or she shall not be eligible for re-election as Members for a period of one year following retirement but may be elected to be one of the officers of the Council.
- (vi) Other Council Members shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting for one year and shall be eligible for re-election.
- (vii) Ordinary and Associate members can be co-opted onto the Council at the discretion of the elected Council officers.
- c) (i) Any Officers or Members of the Council, or the whole Council may be removed from office and be replaced, by a three-quarters majority vote at an Extraordinary General Meeting at which two thirds of the Members eligible to vote are present or represented by proxy.
 - (ii) Any Officer or Member of the Gouncil who ceased to be a Member of the Institute shall automatically cease to be an Officer or Member of Council.
 - (iii) An elected representative of students shall represent non-voting members on the Council.
- d) (i) The Council shall meet at least once in every two months. The President or any four Members of the Council, may by written request to the Secretary, require an Extraordinary Meeting of the Council to be called within fourteen days after the receipt of such request by the Secretary.

- (ii) At any meeting of the Council a quorum shall be four including any two officers.
- e) The Council shall have the power, on behalf of the Institute to:
 - (i) acquire by purchase, gifts by way of donation, bequest or otherwise, hold, possess and manage property both movable and immovable;
 - (ii) lease and rent any property on such terms as they shall think fit;
 - (iii) compound or compromise any action suit or proceedings or any debt;
 - (iv) open an account at any bank, savings bank or building society operating in Botswana, effect any payment into such account or withdraw any sum therefrom;
 - (v) appoint such committee or sub-committee as they shall deem fit;
 - (vi) appoint such representatives as they shall deem fit to take part in any activities, professional or social in Botswana or elsewhere;
 - (vii) sue or be sued, implead or be impleaded under the name of the BIDP;
 - (viii) appoint employees, either permanent or temporary, for such duties and at such remuneration as they deem necessary;
 - (ix) the Council shall not be entitled to commit the Institute by purchase or otherwise in excess of funds currently held, unless a two thirds majority at a General Meeting or an Extraordinary General Meeting shall so authorize.
- f) The Council may make such regulations as they deem necessary for good management of the Institute in the furtherance of the objects thereof and in accordance with the Constitution provided that all such Regulations shall be submitted for approval to the next Annual General Meeting after the making thereof.

6. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

- a) The Annual General Meeting of the Institute shall be held within 3 months of the end of the financial year on such date and at such place as the Council shall appoint.
- b) The Annual General Meeting shall be convened by notices addressed by the Secretary to all Members not less than twenty-one clear days prior to the date thereof; such notice shall include an Agenda for the Meeting, and a copy of the Annual Accounts.

- c) The quorum for an Annual General Meeting shall be ten paid up members including at least four Members of the Council.
- d) The business of the Annual General Meeting shall be:
 - (i) to receive, deliberate upon and if thought fit accept the Report of the Council and the Annual Accounts;
 - (ii) to elect the Officers and Members of the Council;
 - (iii) to deliberate and vote upon such motion as the Council shall have included or been asked to include in the Agenda sent out with the convening notice.
- e) Any Member wishing to put down a motion for discussion at the Annual General Meeting shall submit it in writing to the Secretary before the 1st July preceding the Annual General Meeting; provided, however, that nothing in the clause shall prevent a Member present at an Annual General Meeting from proposing during the course of the Meeting an amendment to any motion included in the Agenda.
- f) Voting at the Annual General Meeting shall be by show of hands of paid up Members eligible to vote or by ballot if so demanded by the person presiding or not less than five Members present and voting. In case of equality of votes, the person presiding shall have a casting vote.

7. EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

- a) Extraordinary General Meetings shall be held at such times and places as the Council may decide, either when requested to do so in writing by any five Members eligible to vote or upon its own decision, but so that any such meeting is held within twenty-one days of the receipt of such decision.
- b) Any notice by any five Members upon its own requesting an Extraordinary General Meeting shall set out in full the motion which they intend to put to such meetings.
- c) The Secretary shall convene an Extraordinary General Meeting by notice in writing to all Members. The convening notice shall give fourteen days notice and shall include an agenda for the meeting, which shall set out any motion which is to be put to the meeting.
- d) A quorum and voting procedures shall be as for an Annual General Meeting.
- e) If a quorum is not achieved at the first EGM, a second shall be convened. No quorum is required at this meeting.

8. ORDINARY MEETINGS

Ordinary Meetings may be called from time to time by the Secretary on the decision of the Council. Ordinary Meetings shall be convened by notice in writing to all Members. Members may invite quests to attend Ordinary Meetings.

9. AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION

No amendment shall be made to this Constitution except by two-thirds majority of the Full Members present or represented by proxy at a General Meeting.

10.PROXY VOTING AT GENERAL MEETINGS

When a Member is representing another by proxy he or she shall have in his or her possession at the Meeting a written statement signed by the Member eligible to vote not present in person setting out:

- a) the name of the Member to whom the proxy vote is given;
- b) the date and place of the meeting;
- c) the resolution upon which a proxy vote is given;
- d) whether the proxy vote is to be affirmative, negative or discretionary.

11.ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

- a) All members shall pay annual subscriptions to the Institute, at amounts which shall be fixed by Council by Regulation from time to time.
- b) Annual Subscriptions shall be payable upon election or on the 1st July each year. Only paid up members will be given the right to vote at the AGM.
- c) A Member elected after the AGM shall pay subscription on a pro-rata basis.

12.ANNUAL REPORT

The Council shall present to the Annual General Meeting a Report of the activities and financial statements of the previous year together with the President's form of address.

13.DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY

The secretary shall:

- a) draw up Minutes of the proceedings of all Meetings of the Institute and of the Council. The Minutes shall, after confirmation at the ensuing meeting, be signed by the person presiding and the Secretary;
- b) keep a Register of Members in which shall be recorded:-
 - (i) the names and surnames of each Member;
 - (ii) the address of each Member;
 - (iii) the date of his election;
 - (iv) such other particulars as the Council may require.
- c) have custody of the records of the Institute.
- d) is responsible for the collection and appropriate response to all incoming mail.

14.DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

The Treasurer shall:

- a) keep the accounts of the Institute and all such accounts shall be open to inspection by any person having an interest in the funds of the Institute;
- b) effect or accept any payment;
- c) give full and valid discharge for any debt and sign any receipt therefore;
- d) pay into the Institute's Bank Account as soon as may be, all monies received by him, but providing that he may keep in his possession for petty cash such sum as may be prescribed by the Regulation by the Council from time to time;
- e) prepare the Annual Accounts as at the 30th June each year and statement of accounts as at such other time as the President may require;
- f) produce his books for examination whenever required to do so by the President or the Auditor;
- g) in conjunction with any one other Officer sign all cheques drawn on the Institute's Bank Accounts.
- h) if circumstances demand, temporary delegate his signing responsibility to another Member of Council.

15.ACCOUNTS

An accountant shall be appointed by the Council to prepare the financial accounts prior to be presentation at the AGM.

16.DEEDS

Every Deed, Act or Legal Document relating to the Institute shall be signed by the President and the Secretary.

17.BRANCHES

Branches of the Institute in different parts of Botswana may be formed subject to the approval of the Council.

18.PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

All members shall conform to the Rules of Professional Conduct which the Council may make by Regulation.

19.DISCIPLINE

The Council shall have the power to caution, reprimand or expel from the Institute any member who, in the reasonable opinion of the Council, is found to have contravened the rules of professional conduct made by the Council. Provided that the Council shall, before exercising their powers under this sub-section, notify the Member concerned in writing, by registered letter, of the complaint and he or she shall be asked if he or she wishes to submit a written or verbal explanation to the Council within sixty days. No action shall be taken by the Council until the expiry of this period of sixty days. The powers of the Council under this subsection can only be exercised by the unanimous decision of a quorum (4) or two thirds majority of the Council Members in attendance whichever shall be the greater.

20.DISSOLUTION

- a)The Institute shall only be dissolved at an Extraordinary General Meeting called for that purpose at which three quarters of the votes cast are in favour of a resolution to this effect. If no quorum is obtained, the proposal to dissolve the Institute shall be submitted to a further Extraordinary General Meeting which shall be held one month later. Notice in writing of this meeting shall be given to all Members of the Institute at least 21 days before the date of the meeting.
- b) The dissolution shall be subject to the law existing at that time.
- c) When the dissolution of the Institute has been effected in accordance with the law and this Constitution, no further action shall be taken by the Council or any Officer of the Institute in connection with the aims of the Institute other than the notification of the dissolution of the Institute to members, applicants for membership, correspondents and the notification to the trustees of known assets and liabilities of the Institute. Any cash in hand shall be paid to the trustees.
- d) In the event of dissolution, the Bank in which the Institute monies are deposited shall act as trustees and liquidator and shall wind up the affairs of the Institute in accordance with the law.

BOTSWANA INSTITUTE OF DEVELOPMENT PROFESSIONS: REGULATIONS

SECTION 1: FINANCE

- 1.All cheques and orders drawn upon any Bank Account of the institute shall be signed by the Hon. Treasurer and either the President, Vice-President or Hon. Secretary, or as delegated by Hon. Treasurer.
- 2. Any withdrawals upon an Institute Building Society Account or authorisation for the sale of any other investment, shall be signed by the Hon. Treasurer and either the President, Vice President or Hon. Secretary, or as delegated by Hon. Treasurer but such withdrawals or sale shall only be made upon a Resolution of the Council to that effect.
- 3. a) Annual Subscriptions to the Institute shall be paid at the following rates:-
- (i) Ordinary Members P 84.00
- (ii) Associate Members P 75.00
- (iii) Student Members P 50.00
- (iv) Corporate Members P750.00

proposed Regulation

SECTION II: RULES OF CONDUCT

- 1.No Member shall conduct himself or herself in such a manner as to prejudice his or her professional status or the reputation of the Institute.
- 2. No Member shall be connected in any way with any occupation or business which is incompatible with membership of the Institute.

- 3. It shall be the duty of every Member:
- a) when acting for a client whose interests conflict with his or her own to disclose the relevant facts to his or her client;
- b) to ensure that neither he or her personally nor any firm or company carrying on
 Professional Practice which he or she is a partner or director acts for two or more parties with conflicting interests without disclosing the relevant facts to those parties.
- 4. No Member shall carry on the Professional Practice under the protection of a limited company without the consent of the Council, and such consent shall only be given subject to the following conditions:-
- a) That any such company must have a fully paid up share capital of not less than P10,000.00 or P2.500.00 per proprietary director whichever is the greater.
- b) That any such company must have a professional indemnity policy giving cover to the company and its employees of not less than P500,000.00 with a voluntary excess not to exceed the paid up share capital of the company.
- c) That the combined shareholdings in any such company of persons or bodies whose interest is held wholly or mainly as an investment shall not exceed 25% of the fully paid up share capital; that such combined shareholdings shall not together carry more than 25% of the total voting rights in the company; that none of the shares so held shall be owned directly or indirectly by an incompatible investor; and that none of the shares so held shall be assigned without the consent of the Board of Directors.
- d) That any Member requesting such consent shall submit to the Hon. Secretary a copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company concerned together with the name of shareholders and their holdings for the approval of Council, and shall if his or her request is granted submit annually to Council a certificate from the Company's auditors to the effect that the Constitution of the company has not changed in any way and that the distribution of shareholdings remained unchanged.
- e) Consent, if granted, shall be deemed to be automatically withdrawn upon any changes being made in the constitution or shareholding of the company unless and until such changes have been approved by the Council.
- 5. Every Member who is a sole principal of a practice or a partner in a firm or a director or a company carrying on Professional Practice shall be held responsible for any contravention of the Regulations committed by any other partner or director of by any Member of the staff of such practice, firm or company; provided that if such sole principal, partner or director as the case may be shall show that he or her has, prior to such contravention, taken all such steps as may be reasonable to ensure that such contravention was not committed he or she may be acquitted of responsibility for such contravention.

- 6. a) No Member shall in his or her professional capacity accept, otherwise than for the benefit of a client, any trade or other commercial discount or commission from any trader whose business consists in the provision of goods or services used in the construction or maintenance industries.
- b) Subject to sub-paragraph (a) hereof, a Member may accept a discount in respect of goods or services ordered by him or her on behalf of a client provided full disclosure is made to the client.

7. No Member shall:

- a) offer to provide whether to a prospective client or a third party any gift or favour in money or money's worth designed to secure instructions for work;
- b) with the object of securing instructions or supplanting another Member knowingly attempt to compete on the basis of fees and commissions where there is a statutory scale of fees or a scale of fees recommended by the Institute except where Institutional foreign donors are demanding or non-BIDP consultants are offering competition on the basis of fees. Such competition is to be simultaneous, and BIDP consultants are to give a precise definition of the services to be performed for the fee quoted;
- c) pay any fee or commission to a third party for the introduction of a client;
- d) act or offer to act in any capacity in relation to any matter which is the subject of judicial or quasi-judicial proceedings either on the basis that no charge will be made unless the proceedings are successful or on the basis that the amount of the charge will be related to the degree of success attained.
- 8. No Member shall solicit instructions for work in any manner whatsoever; provided that this rule shall not apply in the case of a regular client unless the Member knew or ought to have known that the work in question had already been entrusted to another professional advisor.
- 9. Subject to the Regulations, every Member shall:-
- a) keep in one or more bank accounts separate from his or her own, his or her firm's or his or her company's bank account as the case may be, any monies held by or entrusted to him or her, the firm or the company in any capacity other that of beneficial owner;
- b) account at the due time for all monies held as aforesaid, less any legitimate deductions therefrom, to the parties entitled thereto.
- 10. No Member shall carry on practice under any such name, style or title as to prejudice his or her professional status or the reputation of the Institute.

- 11. Every Member shall ensure that the form, content and method or publication and distribution of any advertisement, announcement, article, leaflet, brochure or other publicity material of any kind whatsoever published, issued or authorised by him or her are neither misleading to the public nor such as to prejudice his or her professional status or the reputation of the Institute.
- 12. The use of BIDP crests on site notice boards is restricted to practices operated by Members resident in Botswana, and they may only be used in conjunction with the professional functions represented by BIDP.





Understanding US Copyright Basics
By Eugene R. Quinn, Jr.

A copyright is a form of intellectual property protection that granted by the federal government. A copyright, however, is not "granted" in the same manner in which a patent is granted. A patent will be issued only after an application has been filed with and approved by the United States Patent and Trademark Office. To the contrary, a copyright is provided to the authors of "original works of authorship," regardless of whether the work has been published and regardless of whether the work has been registered. Unlike patents, copyrights come into being at the moment an original work is fixed in a tangible medium of expression. While there are significant advantages to federal registration of a copyright, no registration is required in order for a copyright to exist. Likewise, no registration is required for an author to begin using the familiar copyright symbol --- ©, but given the cost and benefit you should absolutely obtain a registered copyright. If you need assistance doing this I highly recommend Legalzoom.com's copyright registration service. Despite the fact that originality is indeed the so-called "sine qua non" of a copyright, all works that are original are not necessarily entitled to copyright protection. Copyright protection can exist only in original works of authorship if the work is also fixed in a tangible medium of expression from which the work can be perceived, reproduced, or otherwise communicated, either directly or with the aid of a machine or device. Works of authorship for which copyright protection are available include the following categories or works: (1) literary works; (2) musical works, including any accompanying words; (3) dramatic works, including any accompanying music; (4) pantomimes and choreographic works; (5) pictorial, graphic, and sculptural works; (6) motion pictures and other audiovisual works; (7) sound recordings; and (8) architectural works. In addition to these categories specifically enumerated in the Copyright Act, the subject matter of copyright also includes compilations and derivative works. The copyright in a compilation or derivative work extends only to the material contributed by the author of such work, as distinguished from the preexisting material employed in the work, and does not imply any exclusive right in the preexisting material. The copyright in either a compilation or derivative work is independent of, and does not affect or enlarge the scope, duration, ownership, or existence of, any copyright protection enjoyed by the author of the preexisting material. Copyright protection for a work employing preexisting material does not extend to any part of the work in which such material has been used unlawfully.

Copyright protection, however, does not and cannot exist for an idea, procedure, process, system, method of operation, concept, principle, or discovery, regardless of the form in which it is described or embodied. This is true because a copyright protects only the form of expression rather than the subject matter of the writing. It is simply not the function of the copyright laws to protect anything other than original expression. Ideas are not protected by copyright law because protecting an idea would take the idea out of the public domain and would prevent others from using the idea to create their own independent and original works of authorship. Such an occurrence would frustrate the very purpose of copyright law, which is to stimulate creativity and provide the appropriate incentives to foster the creation of more artistic works.

The principle that expression is copyrightable and ideas are not copyrightable is sometimes difficult to apply. Courts consider what is

called the idea/expression dichotomy to help focus on whether the idea is capable of various modes of expression, or whether protection of the expression would ipso facto protect the idea, which cannot be tolerated. The idea/expression dichotomy is a necessary part of copyright law because clinging to the rule that ideas are not copyrightable becomes difficult when the idea and the form of the expression necessarily coincide. If there is only a limited number of ways in which to express something the expression is said to merge with the idea and neither are copyrightable. In order to determine if the idea and expression have merged it is necessary to first identify the idea that the work seeks to express, and then determine whether the idea can be distinguished from the author's expression. If the idea and expression are inseparable, then the merger doctrine applies and the expression is not entitled to copyright protection because to grant copyright protection would be tantamount to granting protection to the idea. If, however, the idea can be divorced from and exist wholly outside the expression, the expression is deserving of copyright protection, provided of course that the requirements of originality and fixation have been met.

For example, a novel about World War II could be copyrighted, but this would only prevent others from copying the novel; it would not prevent others from writing an original novel about World War II. Similarly, a description of a machine could be copyrighted, but this would only prevent others from copying the description; it would not prevent others from writing a description of their own or from making and using the machine. To prevent the making and using of the machine one would have to obtain patent protection. Likewise, a copyright would not prevent an individual from using a discovery or principle or law of nature. If such procedures, processes, systems, methods, concepts, principles, discoveries or inventions are to be protected as intellectual property it is patent law that must proved the protection, not the copyright laws.

The owner of a copyright has what is best referred to as a bundle of exclusive rights. The exclusive rights of the copyright owner allow the owner to do and/or to authorize any of the following: (1) reproduction of the copyrighted work in copies or phonorecords; (2) preparation of derivative works based upon the copyrighted work; (3) distribution of copies or phonorecords of the copyrighted work to the public by sale or other transfer of ownership, or by rental, lease, or lending; (4) in the case of literary, musical, dramatic, and choreographic works, pantomimes, and motion pictures and other audiovisual works, to perform the copyrighted work publicly; (5) in the case of literary, musical, dramatic, and choreographic works, pantomimes, and pictorial, graphic, or sculptural works, including the individual images of a motion picture or other audiovisual work, to display the copyrighted work publicly; and (6) in the case of sound recordings, to perform the copyrighted work publicly by means of a digital audio transmission.

The fact that the copyright owner enjoys "exclusive rights" should not be understood to mean that only the copyright owner may engage in the listed activities (i.e., copying, distributing, performing, etc.). The right of the copyright owner is exclusive in nature, but far from absolute. This is true because of what is called "fair use." The Copyright Act allows for copyright works to be used, and for such use not to be considered infringement, for purposes such as criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching, scholarship, and/or research, so long as the work is "fairly used." In determining whether the use in any particular case is a fair use Courts must consider four factors: (1) the purpose and character of the use, including whether such use is of a commercial nature or is for nonprofit educational purposes; (2) the nature of the copyrighted work; (3) the amount and substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole; and (4) the effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copyrighted



THE CONTINUING STRUGGLE AGAINST CORRUPTION — A FRESH APPRAISAL BY THE GOVERNMENT OF BOTSWANA

For several years Botswana has enjoyed the reputation for being the least corrupt country in Africa. We have deserved that reputation but we cannot afford to be complacent. The menace of corruption is ever present and we must ensure our defences arc in good order.

It is 13 years since the Directorate on Corruption arid Economic Crime was established to lead the fight against corruption. The Government has decided that it is time to review what has been achieved, how things stand at present and what should be done for the future.

With the help of The international anticorruption specialists, de Speville & Associates, the Government has been examining the issues involved. The specialists have been asked to consult the community on the main issues with the help at a technical team from the DCEC and the support of the European Union representative office in Botswana. The views of all sectors of society are being sought on the current state of corruption in the count~ and on what should be done to ensure that Botswana stays on top of the problem and raises its international standing

This Consultation Paper does two tinge: first, it provides information about the main aspects of fighting corruption and what the Government is considering; second, it seeks the views of individuals and representative organisations from all sectors.

Progress made

The problem only gets worse. Repression alone never works. They have realised that, in addition to investigation and prosecution, two other this must be done. First, people need to be educated about the harm corruption causes and how they can help fight against it. Second the system in which people work must be improved so that corruption is prevented by removing the opportunity and temptation to behave corruptly. Of course, the laws against corruption must be effectively enforced as well. These three elements – enforcement, prevention and education – have been working together in

Botswana and form the current strategy against corruption. This strategy has also proved to be successfully in other countries.

Investigating policy

It is crucially important that the anticorruption authority should investigate every complaint of corruption made to it that is capable of being investigated, whether the matter appears large of small. There are five reasons for adopting such a policy.

First, putting aside a minor allegation will deter the complainant from, returning, perhaps with a much more important matter.

Second, what at first appears minor quite often turns out to be important when investigated.

Third, picking an choosing what to investigate and what not to investigate raises suspicions of improper motives, if not of corruption.

Fouth, ignoring some complaints gives the impression that some corruption is tolerated. That double standards apply.

Finally, the fact Is that widespread small scale corruption can do serious damage to the ethical climate of a country and that a single small act of corruption can have disproportionately serous consequences.

The amount of resources put into investigating what is indeed a minor matter will, of course, be small of comparison to the resources put into investigating a major matter. What is important is that in both cases the public should feel the complainant has been investigated.

This investigating policy is vital in developing the trust of the community, without whose support corruption cannot be defeated.

In order to succeed, an anticorruption body must be independent from other Government, agencies. From political interference and from pressure from the executive powers of the state. But independence should not be absolute. The body must be accountable to the community, - to the elected representatives of the people, to the courts of justice, to the people themselves. Only In hat way will be public have confidence that the body is doing its job properly. But accountability must not become interference. Interference undermines accountability and leads to loss of independence, with the result that the people will no longer have confidence in the integrity and impartially of the body.

The DCEC is not described in law as an independent body. The Director is appointed by the President for an indefinite tern, but can be relieved of his post at any moment, in contrast to the Auditor General and the Electoral Commission whose appointments can be terminated only in the way prescribed by law. The DECC is a public office and the Public Service Act applies to it and its officers. The Director is not the appointing or disciplinary authority of the DCEC staff; those functions are performed by tie Directorate of Public Service management. While its accounts are audited by the Auditor General, its annual report is made to the President who, as a matter of practice but not of law, lays it before Parliament, Also as a matter at practice but not of law, the annual report is made available to the public

Openness and confidentiality

That principle applies particularly to an anticorruption body, which must develop and keep public support On the other hand confidentiality must also be a guiding principle in flghtingg corruption. If information given in confidence leaks out of the anticorruption body and becomes public, the sources of information will dry up. Without information the anticorruption is not able to investigate.

Public Officials and gifts

In many countries the honourable tradition of giving gifts has been perverted, public officials expect end even demand a gift before doing the job they are paid to do. In all modern states the regulations of public service service forbid public officials from accepting gifts. Those regulations in many countries have had little effect because the regulations are not enforced. Other countries have found it necessary to make it an offence for a public servant to ask for or accept a gift unless he has the approval of the head of the public service. It is a less serious offence than bribery.

This has proved to be a valuable anti-corruption measure. It deals with those numerous cases whee it cannot be proved that the gift was a bribe, and it restores the giving of gifts to its honourable social origins.

The extraction or expectation of gifts by public officials in Botswana has become a problem that should be addressed. The public Service regulations on the matter are not being observed. It is time to consider, making it an Offence in our law for a public Official to accept a gift unless he has permission, do to so.

4.4 METHODOLOGY AND WORK PLAN FOR MECHANICAL CONSULTANCY SERVICES

DESIGN PHILOSOPHY

Our approach is to research constantly on the latest building technologies. We feel that appropriate technology for Botswana is by using moderate economical building fabric to moderate indoor environmental conditions and, where appropriate, actively promote its incorporation into building design. Due to Botswana's hot climate, building thermal insulation would be required to assist in moderating internal conditions. If suitable levels of insulation are used into walls, roofs, glazing and ground slabs, air conditioning cooling and heating load can be reduced significantly to get desired indoor environmental conditions.

Another aspect of design is economic life cycle of the air conditioning system, taking into consideration of capital cost, running cost and life expectancy of building. 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these accounts are set out below:

a) Basis of Preparation

The accounts are prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standards. The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain property, plant and equipment, marketable securities and investment properties.

b) Turnover

Turnover represents subscriptions and other sources of income which are recognised on receipt of payment net of value added taxes and discounts. The organisation operates purely on a cash basis and does not grant credit for any aspect of its operations.

Foreign Currencies

Foreign currency transactions are accounted for at the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions. Gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies, are recognised in the profit and loss account.

d) Depreciation

Depreciation is charged over the estimated useful lives of the assets in equal annual installments to write off each asset over the following peiods.

Furniture and Fittings Office and Equipment 10 years 5 years

e) Stock

Stock and work in progress are valued by members of the Council at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

f) Stock Revaluation Reserve

Stocks of stationery for resale were previously not incorporated into the financial statements. They were brought in during the year ended 30 June 2001 at a valuation of 50 percent of their selling price and the stock revaluation reserve was created to reflect the introduction of the policy for accounting of stock.

Dibete-Mahalapye Road To Be Opened In Sections Beginning 24 September 2007

The Ministry of Works and Transport informs members of the public that section one of the Dibete-Mahalapye Road was opened to traffic on Monday the 24th September 2007 with controlled maximum speeds of 40 Km per hour.

The Ministry of Works and Transport appeals to motorists and other road users to strictly observe the speed restriction to assist the road to cure and mature properly and to also save their vehicles from damage by loose flying stones.

The reason for restricting the speed to 40km per hour is to allow for road surfacing to set and prepare the road for successful road marking later during construction.







1.0	FAREWELL REMARKS	
	Addressing the AGM for the last time as the BOCCIM President, Mr Ebrahim stated that one of BOCCIM's achievements during his term was being able to bring business issues to the top of the national agenda. Also, a lot of trust was built between the Government and the private sector, and advised that this cordial relationship between the two institutions must be nurtured to promote public-private sector dialogue. Mr Ebrahim briefed members that the recently held public-private sector dialogue sponsored by CIPE at the GICC brought delegates from the region to benchmark against Botswana, and the delegates were impressed by the success of public-private dialogue model used in	
	Botswana. He highlighted several challenges that BOCCIM has to stand to, amongst those being: • BOCCIM must all the time have researched positions, and also ensure that Government implements what the organisation advocates for; • Ensure that personal interest doesn't find it's way into the BOCCIM agenda;	
	 Build internal capacity of staff to make them competent in articulating issues; Remain self supportive because external support has the potential of derailing the organisation from its mandate; 	
	 Should be firm yet flexible; Should be conscious of the competing demands of SMMEs and large businesses. The challenge is to keep the debate alive because BOCCIM has always been accused of giving conflicting positions; 	

- Urged business people not be driven by the profit motive, but to also show a gesture of patriotism;
- At times views of the private sector may not be accepted, and in that case, the private sector must go back to the drawing board and come up with alternatives;
- Show respect to our leaders;
- BOCCIM to remain the voice of business by retaining trust and confidence of its members;
- Council members to dedicate their time to serve national interests;
- When dealing with Government, the private sector must not think it has a sole franchise of running the economy. He advised that BOCCIM's responsibility is to flag any problems to Government, and convince them on methodologies, and if not accepted, leave them and come back with more ideas.

Concluding his address, Mr Ebrahim paid tribute to H.E. The President, Vice President and the Members of Parliament for the way that they had accepted his criticisms. He stated that his views at times may have not been popular, and cautioned that as a leader, that's the price that one has pay.

He thanked the media for the support that they had always given him. He acknowledged their contribution in converging BOCCIM opinions.

Mr Ebrahim thanked members for having provided an opportunity for him to lead an organisation such as BOCCIM. He stated that the leadership has been exciting yet mentally challenging experience.

He paid tribute to Mr Dewah for his stewardship, and stated that his job was made easier by the support he provided him.

He expressed confidence on the new Executive Director and that she will carry the mission of BOCCIM forward.

MINUTES OF THE LAST AGM AND MATTERS ARISING

The minutes were adopted. There were no matters arising.

2.0 ADDRESS BY MR JOHN KALUZI - CEO OF BPC

Mr Kaluzi addressed the AGM under the theme, "The current and future power supply situation in Botswana".

Beginning his address, Mr Kaluzi stated that Botswana imports 70% of her power requirements. The new peak of 490MW was a confirmation that the economy was growing, and indeed the growth was essential to achieve prosperity for all by 2016.

He informed the AGM that loads had been growing at an average of 3% per annum; thus the equivalent of building Morupule Power Station per annum.

Mr Kaluzi briefed members that with the new BPC structure. Transmission unit will service big consumers such as mines; Rural Unit will service villages and the Business Unit will ring fence for all services rendered to the rural areas.

He briefed members on the power blackout that occurred in June 2007. He stated that, out of 70% of power imported into the country, 80% comes through Matimba. On that day, at 16:00 hrs, Eskom had a problem with supplying the Matimba line. There was a problem in Tlokweng and Morupule could not manage because Morupule only supplies 30% of the power. He highlighted that it was one of the reasons why the expansion at Morupule was taking place instead of increasing supply from South Africa.

Regarding the growing demand, Mr Kaluzi stated that the 2006 monthly demand indicated that June-August was the maximum peak. As a result, the new tariff would be based on high and low demand. The unit at peak would be 3.5 times that of low peak. There would be incentives for industries that move loads from peak to off peak.

Current strategies for power supply were outlined as follows:

Internal BPC generation to be increased to 600MW

- Other generation at Mmamabula
- Imports: Eskom, Open cycle turbines (2x50 MW) and EDM (Mozambique)

He urged members to use energy efficient bulbs so as to save electricity. Mr Kaluzi urged business people to move loads to off peak and BPC will give incentives. He cautioned that between 2008-2010 wastage should be discouraged at all costs.

3.0 **Questions and Comments**

Ques: Whether business people could assist in energy shortfall over and above the Mmamabula project?

Ans: Mr Kaluzi stated that currently BPC was in partnership with CIC. He stated that the BPC Act was being reviewed to allow private entities to operate in this field.

Ques: BPC was asked why it took them so long to expand yet there was a report justifying the expansion dating back to the 80's? Further to that, wasn't there a need to involve architects in designing energy compatible buildings?

Ans: Mr Kaluzi stated that in 1986, South Africa had a lot of idle plant therefore, there was no need to expand Morupule. The economic factors could not have sold Morupule and Mmamabula. With regard to the design of buildings, BPC was said to be involved with BOBS.

Ques: How would one avoid maximum demand since it starts in the morning?

Ans: In a factory where there are a lot of processes, you avoid starting machines all at a go because you will reach maximum demand. The consumer will be charged on 90% of what they have consumed and this was a strategy for BPC to recover its costs.

Ques: When will BPC have prepaid cards distributed in towns and nearby villages?

Ans: Mr Kaluzi stated that some prepaid consumers bypass meters, and as a result BPC was now introducing Automatic Meter Readings which have an advantage of noting tampering.

Ques: What percentage of electricity will Botswana get from Mmamabula?

Ans: Mr Kaluzi stated that about 25% will remain in Botswana, and the rest exported because Mmamabula is an export project, aiming at diversification and job creation.

4.0 ACCOUNTS

The Treasurer, Mr Matthews briefed members that costs were escalating; yet income was not growing. He cited that revenue for salaries had grown, and this has to match with income.

He advised that instead of using telephones to call overseas, rather use skype to cut costs.

He stated that bad debts were being collected, since some weren't really bad debts like courses that were cancelled.

He recommended an increase of 10% in 2008 in line with inflation, and the last increase was in January 2006.

Mr Matthews briefed members that for 2007, a surplus of P30,000 has been budgeted for. There was a need to have cost controls emphasized, with a definitive plan.

He briefed members that BOCCIM Secretariat intends to undertake a restructuring exercise for effectiveness and improvement of services to members.

Commenting on the accounts, a member wanted to know whether BOCCIM has an Accountant. Mr Matthews stated that BOCCIM needs to restructure and recommend a Chief Financial Manager.

The Accounts were adopted.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF COUNCIL

The following were specially elected; Mr S. Dada, Mr M. Mooney, Dr N. Mbere and Ms R. Vaka.

6.0 ELECTION OF PRESIDENT AND VICE PRESIDENT

Mr Dada proposed that the candidates for President and Vice President be endorsed accordingly since they were unopposed. This proposal was endorsed by the membership, making Mr Mbaakanyi the new BOCCIM President and Mr Johnson the Vice President.

REMARKS BY MR MBAAKANYI

Accepting his new position, Mr Mbaakanyi thanked members for having confidence in him, in particular the BOCCIM Council for continuing to believe in his capabilities.

He stated that he was taking over from a man who has built a solid structure for BOCCIM, and that his tracks are clear and visible. He assured members that he will not leave them fade but will advance them further.

Mr Mbaakanyi assured members that the BOCCIM Secretariat under the leadership of the Executive Director will have his support.

He briefed members that with regard to private-public sector dialogue, BOCCIM will continue to discuss topical issues with the Government of the day, and the strength of BOCCIM would be in coming up with one united voice. He urged members to state their views through the Secretariat.

He cautioned members that good governance was one of the key mandates of BOCCIM, and urged members to stay out of corruption and promote high integrity.

In managing the affairs of BOCCIM, Mr Mbaakanyi requested members not to wash their linen in public, to avoid becoming a laughing stock.

He promised members that the fight against crime would continue. He assured members that BOCCIM would also be committed to the global trade agenda.

7.0

The private sector as a partner in development would continue to complement Government efforts. He stated that the private sector would be gender sensitive in all its structures, in line with the gender policy.

Mr Mbaakanyi stated that his vision in the medium and long term is to see the private sector with a business agenda. He called on all members to dream and take their organisation to greater heights.

In conclusion, Mr Mbaakanyi stated that he was open to views of every BOCCIM member, and promised that he was their messenger not their master.

CLOSING REMARKS BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Ms Machailo-Ellis thanked all the people who welcomed her, in particular the President of BOCCIM and his Council.

She stated that BOCCIM has challenges, especially during this era in which countries are signing bilateral and multilateral agreements, and BOCCIM has to look at the implications of these agreements in business.

She informed members that Economic Partnership Agreements (EPAs) will be signed before the end of 2007 and stated that she was not sure what this meant for Botswana. She stated that South Africa has an agreement with the European Union, and there was already a rumour that the new agreement would be based on the South African one.

Ms Machailo-Ellis stated that BOCCIM was facing financial challenges, and she was tasked with turning the organisation from an P800,000 loss to P30,000 profit. She urged members to support their organisation.

Commenting on the words of the Executive Director, Mr Ramesh briefed members that they had signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Indian Merchant Chamber. He stated that it was an organisation that BOCCIM could learn from, including their structure. He also briefed members that some of the members of the Indian Chamber would be coming to Botswana and urged those who would be available to meet them.
